1. Keeping up to date with the literature around your review topic



Liz at the CSG runs searches for your reviews, but **it is useful for teams to keep up to date with their topic in between searches.**

One way to do this is to set electronic alerts.

You can do this in PubMed® by saving a search and requesting that when new papers are published that meet your search criteria, the references are emailed to you.

1. To create an alert you must be signed in. **Go to the PubMed homepage** at <http://www.ncbi.nlm.nih.gov/pubmed/> To **sign in** or register, click **Sign In** at the top, right of the screen.

2. Then **type in your search terms**, and click on **Save Search**.

Q: Will I get lots of emails from PubMed cluttering up my inbox?

A: Alerts can be set up on a daily, weekly or monthly basis.

Q: What if I want to change the frequency of my alerts, or stop them altogether?

A: Log in to PubMed and go to My NCBI at the top, right of the screen. Click on Manage Saved Searches. You can then delete or modify your search, or change the frequency of alerts.


